Comments:	<p>Searches of those aged 17 and under have decreased by -28% in 2018/19 when compared to the same period in 2017/18. During the same period searches of those aged 18-24 have decreased by -12%. 17 and under searches are notably below the Force's total number of Stop searches which have decreased by -14% in the year to date.</p> <p>Those aged 17 and under account for 17.7% of the total number of stop searches recorded across the Force during this period, whereas those aged 18-24 account for 29.3%.</p> <p>Whilst the largest number of searches of those aged 17 and under are conducted on White individuals, Black and Black British individuals are more likely to be</p>

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	<p>searched when looking at the rate per 1,000 population based on School Census data.</p> <p>Drugs is the most commonly searched for item, accounting for 52.9% of searches of those aged 17 and under and 84.2% of those aged 18-24.</p> <p>As a Force we have a protocol to analyse what we are doing relating to Stop & Search.</p>

Comments:	<p>Whilst the number of 10-13 year olds arrested in Q1-2 18/19 is nearly double that recorded in Q1-2 17/18 it is comparable to figures recorded in Q1 16/17. There were two individuals aged 10-13 who were detained overnight in Q2 18/19.</p> <p>The number of 14-16 year olds arrested during Q2 18/19 remained on a par with the previous quarter (Q1 18/19) and was a decrease on the same period last year (Q2 17/18). The number of 14-16 year olds detained overnight in Q2 18/19 was a noticeable reduction compared to the same period last year.</p> <p>The number of 17 year olds arrested in Q2 18/19 was comparable to the previous quarter (Q1 18/19) and the same period last year (Q2 17/18).</p> <p>The number of 18-24 year olds arrested in Qw 18/19 was a slight increase on the previous quarter (Q1 18/19) and was lower than the same period last year (Q1 17/18).</p> <p>All CYPs accepted into custody have met Code G and lengthy stays in Custody have been due to remand into court, waiting for appropriate adults. To ensure that CYPs are being held and dealt with expeditiously, every CYP will be reviewed by the Custody Inspector and any issues will be addressed and recorded on CYP daily summary report.</p>

Comments:	Outcome 21 relates to the following disposal: "Further investigation which could provide evidence sufficient to support formal action being taken against the suspect is not in the public interest". This outcome is predominantly used in cases such as sexting where it is not deemed appropriate to criminalise a child.

A quarter of the uses of outcome 21 in the year to date relate to 'other offences', which is where sexting offences sit. From the breakdown of other offences we can see that 23 of the 24 uses of outcome 21 in this category are for sexting offences.
Use of outcome 21 is most prevalent among those aged between 14 and 16 years old.

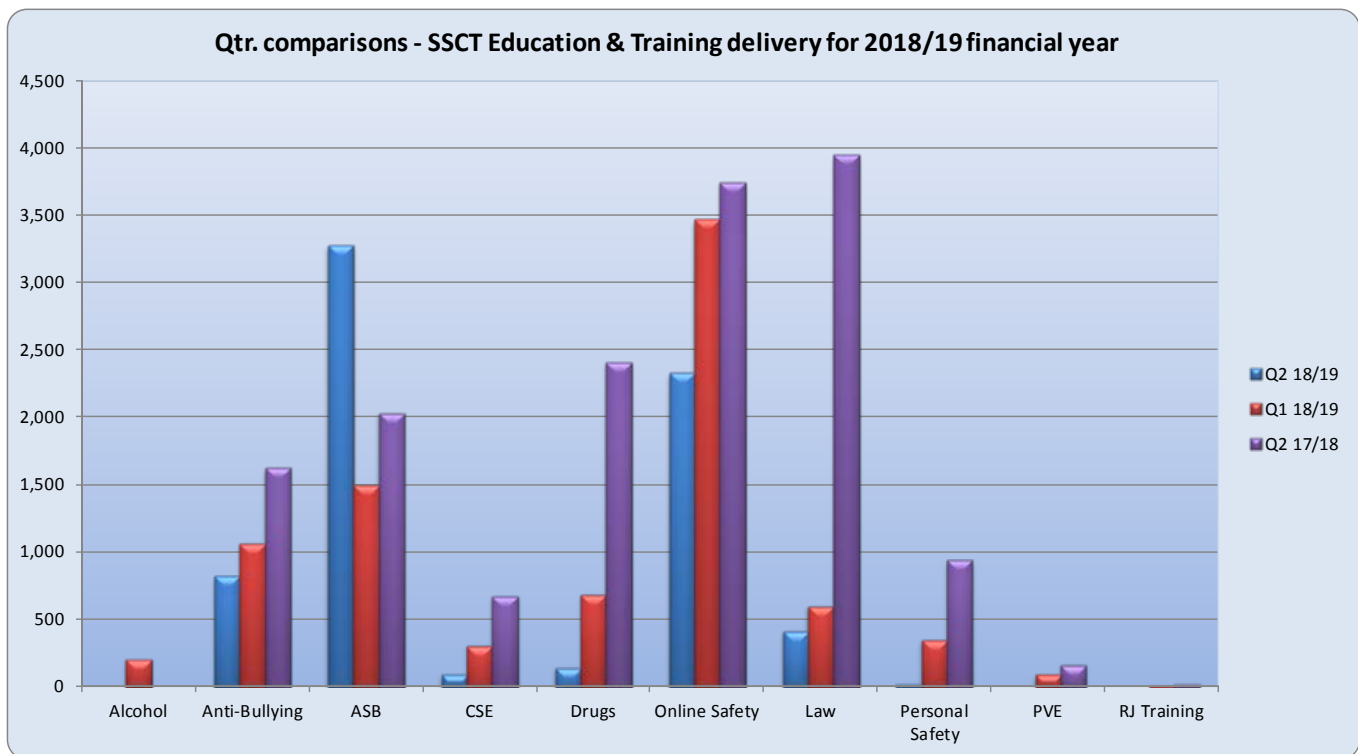
